## Common expressions to show effects or results

The / one effect of redundancies on morale is extremely damaging.

Taking too much medicine can have an effect on people's health.

It is a result of a wise policy.

When/if the road is narrow, the result is just more traffic.

Not polluting the environment has a positive result.

Annie's death was a predictable results of his actions.

His broken leg is **the direct result of** his own carelessness.

Adjectives can be used with effect: negative, positive, beneficial, profound, indirect, harmful, special, etc.

Adjectives can be used with result: positive, predictable, practical, satisfactory, remarkable, etc.
